from the Rabbi

I love spring cleaning. The warming temperatures naturally compel me to spend more time outdoors with my family. After even a mild winter, I feel relief and gratitude at the increasing daylight and the beauty of the world in bloom. Preparing for Pesach also gives me the opportunity to not only clean out my shelves, fridge, and freezer, but to try and refresh my body, mind, and soul.

This has been a difficult year. I continue to struggle with grief and anger resulting from the terrible attacks of October 7th and the ensuing war. I hope that retelling the story of our ancient liberation from Egyptian slavery can inspire us to work for freedom and justice both in Israel/Gaza and in our own country. The liturgy, rituals, and special foods of Passover are there to remind us that this sacred work is multifaceted and ongoing.

There has been much at Temple Emanuel which has sustained me over the past few months and much more to come as we head towards the quiet of summer. For the past 2 years, I have had the honor of facilitating a class on mussar, Jewish ethics and values. Focusing on some of my growing edges, including patience and humility, has reminded me that personal growth is difficult but also meaningful and important. It's been a real blessing to teach the class, and I look forward to continued learning.

Speaking of continued learning, I hope to begin a new Adult B'nei Mitzvah cohort this fall. Whether or not you celebrated Bar or Bat Mitzvah as a 13 year old, you are welcome to join. The Adult B'nei Mitzvah course is a two year commitment where we will take a deep dive into Jewish history, liturgy, lifecycle, philosophy, and theology. Learning Hebrew will be a component of the course, and it will culminate with a group Adult B'nei Mitzvah service in the Spring of 2026. If you are interested in enrolling in the class or would like to learn more, please get in touch and be on the lookout for an informational session this Fall.



I hope that retelling the story of our ancient liberation from Egyptian slavery can inspire us to work for freedom and justice both in Israel/Gaza and in our own country.

I also hope you'll consider coming to Shavuot, our festival of learning, as we celebrate the Confirmation of five of our incredible teen leaders on Tuesday evening, June 11th. The Role of an Educator

As I sat down to write this, I began to think of all the roles our educators undertake on a daily basis; researcher, creator, collaborator, partner, documenter, and provoker began my list. I then took a dive to discover what I was missing. I found this quote that more eloquently states the idea I am trying to portray, "[W]e need a teacher who is sometimes the director, sometimes the set designer, sometimes the curtain and the backdrop, and sometimes the prompter. A teacher is both sweet and stern, who is the electrician, who dispenses the paints, and who is even the



audience – the audience who watches, sometimes claps, sometimes remains silent, full of emotion, who sometimes judges without skepticism, and at other times applauds with enthusiasm" (Loris Malaguzzi, 2006). As the founder of the Reggio Emilia Approach in Italy following World War 2, Loris Malaguzzi understood the multifaceted role of the educator.

The role of educators is a balancing act. They are balancing the needs of each of the 10-15 children in their class, with the needs of each of the families of these children, the needs of their co-workers, the administration, and their own personal needs.







They are meeting each of these 10-15 children at their specific developmental level –scaffolding learning to guide the children through their cognitive dilemmas. They meet children with compassion, understanding, and challenge. They understand there is more at stake than just passing down knowledge. Our educators are helping to mold our future. They are inspiring children to problem solve, believe in their own capabilities, and build understanding about the world around them. They are instilling powerful values about being human.

All this, while providing care, meeting the basic needs each child has to be seen and loved. Our educators provide this for children; creating environments that are safe and engaging. They are cleaning scraped knees, changing diapers, and giving hugs when children are sad. They are preparing snacks and cleaning classrooms. They are communicating with families- supporting different parenting styles and strategies, different cultural beliefs and philosophies.

As you are reading this I am sure you are thinking, wow that sounds difficult – why do educators choose this role? I know for me; it is because I am passionate about early childhood education and the change it can bring for our future. In moments when a child makes connections and builds knowledge about the world – they feel powerful. In moments, when a child is seeking to be seen and I can support them and help them believe in their value – feel powerful. In those moments, when I can laugh with a group of children and find joy in an everyday moment – the future feels powerful. It is in these powerful moments that I know I can make a difference in the world and our future.

from the President

By now I hope you all have seen the letter from Rabbi Adam and me, introducing a monthly giving circle we are calling the Chai Collective.

Some of you are probably wondering what this is, and why we've started it. Put simply, the Chai Collective is a group of members who have committed to making a monthly donation (for as little as \$18 per month) to sustain our community over the long term. I hope all of you will join.

This is our first initiative in recent years aimed at cultivating a culture of everyday philanthropic donations to Temple Emanuel. We all know what an amazing culture of voluntarism and lay leadership our community has demonstrated throughout our history. Your time and your talents have been integral to the work of the Temple, and the energy and effort that our members bring to what we do here is one of our defining characteristics.

Now we want to build an equally strong foundation of philanthropic giving. It may come as a surprise to you, but the dues our members pay only cover about 60% of our annual budget. Another 20% or so comes from the Early Childhood Center's operating surplus. The rest comes from sources like religious school fees, activities fees, and building rentals. While we have been remarkably stable financially over the years, disruptions during the pandemic highlighted how vulnerable we can be to changing conditions. So, for example, when the ECC isn't operating at full capacity – either because of something dramatic like a global pandemic, or something under the radar like a persistent shortage of qualified early childhood educators in the labor market –we might find ourselves operating with a budget deficit.

Ordinary philanthropy from members like you is what will make the difference for Temple Emanuel in continuing to provide the programming and services we all enjoy, and in weathering periodic downturns. We have all benefited from belonging to this community. Now, your community needs you. Please consider becoming a member of the Chai Collective, and see how much more you can derive from supporting the Temple you love.

from the Director of Congregational Learning

As you read this issue of Kol Kore, we are all busy preparing for the upcoming holiday of Pesach (aka Passover). Pesach is a holiday of both memory and renewal. It is also a holiday with an official role for children - i.e., asking the Four Questions. This tradition neatly encapsulates the Jewish approach to learning, which is asking questions and seeking understanding.

If you visit one of our Religious School classes, you will hear students asking lots of questions about Jewish rituals and traditions. For example, "why is the havdalah candle braided?" and "why aren't there any vowels in the Torah?" These questions are evidence that students are curious about their environment.

Asking questions is not simply a means to gather information. By asking questions, students identify their own knowledge gaps and think critically about what they are learning, assess information, think creatively, and work constructively with others. And, through asking questions together, students gain new insight into their own thinking and learn to value the inquiry process. Questions also form the basis for an active learning experience. A quiet classroom is not always a good thing! A noisy classroom may indicate that students are engaging with the content, making connections with classmates, and expressing their opinions. The key to good teaching is to channel the noise and energy in a constructive way. This is not always an easy task.

I am grateful to our teaching staff for supporting our student learning and welcoming student questions. Unlike the four questions in the seder, our teachers might answer hundreds of questions in just one morning! Through their work, our teachers help each student build a knowledge base and strengthen their Jewish identity. Yasher Koach to them!

This Spring, we have several Adult Learning opportunities for our congregants. Rabbi Adam will continue to teach his twice-monthly class on Mussar. Now that the class has read Alan Moranis' classic Mussar text Everyday Holiness, the class will explore the weekly Torah portions from The Mussar Torah Commentary. All are welcome to join this class which is held every other Thursday from 12 noon - 1:00pm.

GMP has made successful Israel-Arab Peace Projects a priority for 2024-2025,

and is currently studying the merits of supporting the following possibilities:

Hand in Hand - Israel's only network of integrated and bilingual Jewish-Arab schools, was launched in 1997. It has created an inclusive and equal shared culture in each of its 7 pre-K to 12th grade schools, enrolling more than 2,000 students.

EcoPeace Middle East – Founded in 1994, EcoPeace strives to build cooperation among Jordanian, Palestinian, and Israeli environmentalists to overcome adverse effects of climate change and water scarcity, while demonstrating that collaboration rather than conflict can work. Roots – A grassroots organization run by local Palestinians and Israelis seeking to create a culture of nonviolence, understanding and transformation in key areas of the West Bank. Roots activities have included partnership lectures, women's groups, summer camps for children ages 5-12, high school youth group meetings, and interreligious exchanges with adults and religious leaders.

Congregants are encouraged to bring other promising peacebuilding projects to our attention.

Work Continues on New Torah Covers

The Temple's work with fiber artist, Karen Fricke, to create new Torah covers (mantles) is moving forward. We began this work by discussing with the artist, clergy, Religious Practices Committee, and other congregants, what symbolism we would want to incorporate into our new torah mantles. As described in the previous issue of Kol Kore, we selected the olive branch to represent nature, continuity, seasons (of nature and of life), peace, and hope for the future.

To select possible background fabrics for the mantles, Karen scoured the garment district in Manhattan (more on this in Karen's interview online). She sent us samples of possible silk fabrics of different colors and textures. We gathered in the sanctuary twice to look at each fabric in the ark in order to view the fabrics as they would appear in context. After careful consideration, we selected a pale blue/lavender fabric, perhaps best described as periwinkle. We chose this because it picks up the blue of the sky in the stained glass windows, and the colors of the interior of the ark. It represents the colors of sky and water.

We mailed the existing Torah mantles to Karen so she could measure each one accurately. (You may have noticed that for a week or two we used the white Torah mantles typically used on the High Holy Days - that's why.) For the next step, Karen will send us possible fabrics for the olives and leaves. We plan to use fabrics that are diverse in hues, textures, and designs to create visual interest and represent the value of diversity in our community. Once we make those selections, production will begin.
