from the Rabbi

We are smack dab in the middle of our High Holy Day Season, and first and foremost, I wish you and your loved ones a shana tova- a good and sweet year of health, growth, laughter, and love. The High Holy Days mark the time in our lives to pause and assess what is going well and what needs improvement. I am thrilled to share that at Temple Emanuel, things are going very, very well. This summer, we welcomed two incredible new senior staff members to our team, Cantor Lauren Adesnik and Alissa Miller, our new Executive Director. If you haven't gotten a



chance to meet them yet, make that a priority! Both are wise, kind, passionate, and bring years of Jewish leadership and synagogue experience to Temple Emanuel. I have been so impressed with what they have already accomplished, and along with Laura Naide, Dana Robinson, and Tal, our new shaliach, we have a terrific Senior Staff team in place. I'm also so grateful to work in an environment where the rest of our amazing staff and our lay-leaders partner together to create a caring, dynamic, and supportive community, offer incredibly rich and meaningful programming and worship opportunities, and do our part to make change in our community, our country, and our world. But we know that this continues to be a challenging time for our community and for the Jewish people. Please know our team is here to support you however we can; we are honored to launch the Help Our Public Employees initiative (Flax/Adler HOPE Fund) which will provide small grants to folks fired or RIF'd, and our members continue to meet regularly in person, virtually, and in Signal chat groups to share ideas, resources, and experience. If you are interested in getting involved, please contact me and I'll be glad to connect you to the people running these groups and events.

October also marks the 2nd anniversary of the terrible events of 10/7. We continue to pray that the hostages come home immediately- the living to be reunited with their loved ones and the dead for proper burial. Nearly two years later we continue to pray for peace, for the terrible war to end, for Hamas and their evil allies to be resoundingly defeated, for a better and much less extreme Israeli government, and for freedom, security, and tranquility for both peoples who share this small and beautiful piece of land. I look forward to traveling to Israel soon after Simchat Torah to participate in Connections- a conference commemorating the 100th anniversary of the founding of the World Union for Progressive Judaism and learning, praying, and networking with liberal and progressive Jews from across the globe. It will be my third trip to Israel post 10/7 and I look forward to bringing back what I will experience with all of you.

5786 is just beginning, and I can't wait to experience another wonderful year at Temple Emanuel with all of you. Thank you for allowing me to continue to serve you, the Jewish people, and those who journey with us!

from the Cantor

Walking through the Darkness, we are never Alone Cantors as Pastoral Care Givers

A song for ascents.

I turn my eyes to the mountains;

from where will my help come? Psalm 121:1



My help comes from **Adonai**, [Helper greater than myself] maker of heaven and earth. **Psalm 121:2**



We have all been in this moment. An event, usually devastating, but perhaps something joyful as well, arises and in an instant we feel untethered, shaken, like our normal has disappeared. Our normal HAS in fact disappeared, and we are left, often alone with our confused thoughts and emotions, to regain and rebuild a new normal. Many attempt this feat on their own. It is quite an impossible task, and should not be attempted in solitude, but rather in companionship. As Esa Einai, Psalm 121 states, in our moment of shock or trauma, we look upwards- we are falling. Where is our help? It is from our Creator. It is from that which is greater than ourselves. It is from God.

How do we access this kind of Jewish spiritual grounding we are desperately in need of? The first step is recognizing we are in a free fall, and this may take some time to notice on our own. Thankfully our village of family and friends, and yes, our synagogue family and clergy are here to gently guide you into awareness.

And still, where do we go when we need this kind of help? Certainly, we might see a therapist (hopefully so!). Yet, when we are reaching for something greater, it is pastoral care and counseling that becomes a rich, deep, meaningful journey of healing, and of rebuilding. This is where your clergy come in. Yes, clergy, as in rabbi AND cantor. Many folks may not know that there are lots of cantors deeply invested in pastoral care as one of the cornerstones of their cantorate. I am one of those cantors, and I am deeply invested in you.

In lighter terms "yes, cantors ALSO do pastoral care!"

In moments that shake you to your core, I am here for you as a companion, a guide, and a vessel. I am here to hear you, and as a vessel I am here to help you connect to processing, rebuilding, and repair through a Jewish lens. This is a sacred and holy task I take most seriously. Whether sitting together in moments of grieving, in moments of transition, in moments that seemed ordinary but somehow beyond our control became dis-ordered, I hope that you'll reach for the phone and find me.

No, I do not compare myself to the help that is Divine, that comes down from the heavens as our Creator; and at the same time, when we sit together in these moments of pastoral guidance, often times God becomes a part of the discourse and settles in the middle of the relationship we are building. As you continue on your journey, there are many forms the Great Creator may take as your companion, whether you notice it or not. The opening to this path begins with pastoral presence and guidance.

We do not know each other well yet, and so it is easy to reach for the familiar, rather than the unfamiliar or unknown. This too, is so normal for us. We are human, fallible, and we do not like to move into unknown territory. When we take that step into that dark unknown, we can discover light, and beauty and sacred relationships that evolve out of the darkest of moments. Psalm 23, one of the most famous of all one hundred and fifty psalms describes the deep bonds that form out of the depths of blackness we move in.

Though I walk through a valley of deepest darkness,-b

I fear no harm, for You [Divine One, Companion] are with me;

Your rod and Your staff-they comfort me.....Psalm 23:4

Please know you are never alone. Rabbi Adam and I are here to be with you in the range of your life experiences, high and low. I am so grateful to have found such a supportive rabbinic partner to allow me to share in the holy work of pastoral care.

Rabbi Harold Kushner offers this interpretation of Psalm 23. "In this brief psalm we receive "an entire theology, more practical than we can find in many books. [The psalmist] teaches us to look at the world and see it as God would have us see it. Most of all, if we feel alone and adrift in a friendless world, it offers us the priceless reassurance that "Thou art with me."

Please know you are never alone. Rabbi Adam and I are here to be with you in the range of your life experiences, high and low. I am so grateful to have found such a supportive rabbinic partner to allow me to share in the holy work of pastoral care. You are all used to hearing Rabbi Adam's voice on the end of the pastoral phone line. Sometimes, you might hear a little bit of a different voice. That's me, present for you for whatever you might need in that moment. "Thou art with me." We recognize the "Thou" as the Divine "You." God, Creator, that which is Greater than ourselves. We can also know "thou" as the you that is on the other end of the phone line. Your cantor and your rabbi, standing ready as present vessels for your grieving, your growth, your transitions and your joys.

Thank you for the sacred privilege you have bestowed upon me, as your interim cantor. I pray and hope that we might create sacred bonds not only through shared prayer and music, but through pastoral presence and care. I pray that these bonds will grow to become less interim, and more permanent, creating deep and lasting relationships over many years to come.

from the President

As we transition from summer into the crisp days of early fall, I find myself filled with a profound sense of optimism about our Temple Emanuel community. This past year has been one of significant transition—we said goodbye to our beloved Dianne and welcomed our new Executive Director, Alissa Miller, and we've been blessed with the energy and talent of our interim cantor, Lauren Adesnik. Through these changes, what has emerged most clearly is the resilience and warmth of our Temple Emanuel family.

The High Holy Days are upon us, giving us a wonderful opportunity to build momentum through our rich fall programming. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur call us to personal reflection and renewal, but this sacred work happens within the embrace of our community. When we gather to hear the shofar's call or share in the solemnity of Kol Nidre, we're reminded that our individual journeys toward teshuvah are strengthened by the bonds we share.

This fall has already brought us two extraordinary Friday night services. Our Labor Day service welcomed union leaders Doreen Greenwald, President of NTEU, and David Stein, President of MCEA, who shared powerful insights about the dignity of work. At our Board Installation service, we were privileged to host Ahmed Fouad Alkhatib, who leads Realign For Palestine through the Atlantic Council. Ahmed's story—growing up in Gaza City, immigrating to the United States, and founding an organization committed to a two-nation solution through nonviolence and radical pragmatism—offered our community a unique perspective on one of the most complex issues of our time. The thoughtful Q&A dinner that followed, moderated by Rabbi Rosenwasser, created exactly the kind of open dialogue our mission calls us to foster.

We're also deepening our engagement with Israel/Palestine issues through our monthly book club, which launches with "The Gates of Gaza," and our ongoing speaker series. These programs create space for nuanced, respectful dialogue while honoring diverse viewpoints within our community. Our commitment to community care extends beyond the sanctuary walls. Through our newly established Flax/Adler HOPE Fund, we're providing \$1,000 grants to Temple members who have lost their jobs due to federal government or federal government-adjacent cuts. This represents our values in action—supporting our neighbors during uncertain times.

Looking ahead to the High Holy Days, I encourage each of you to find new ways to connect with our Temple family. Whether it's joining our book club, participating in a social action project, or simply reaching out to a fellow member, every connection enriches our community.

As we prepare to welcome 5786, I'm filled with gratitude for the resilience, wisdom, and caring that define Temple Emanuel. May this be a year of continued growth and meaningful engagement.

BUILDING A VIRTUAL COMMUNITY—Written by Carolyn Hirschman

If you've ever attended a High Holy Day service, Shabbat service, or B'nei Mitzvah service online from Temple Emanuel, you can thank Rob Katz and the Technology Committee. Rob revived streaming from the sanctuary, widening attendance to people who cannot come to events in person. "We can have a community, even without being in the temple," notes Rob, a self-described techie who lives in North Bethesda. It all began during the pandemic. After attending online services at New York City's Central Synagogue, Rob wanted to bring that experience to Temple Emanuel, where he's been a member for 14 years, starting when his son Samuel, now 17, attended the Early Childhood Center. In fall 2020, Rob and other members figured out what equipment was needed and, at no cost to the temple, they prerecorded Rabbi Adam and Cantor Lindsay leading High Holy Day services in an empty



sanctuary. "As a community, we could now experience services together virtually at our temple," Rob recalls. Later the team frequently live- streamed services from the Mark Mann Pavilion and the homes of Rabbi Adam, Cantor Lindsay, lay leaders, and B'nei Mitzvah families. "We could reach out to people who we couldn't reach before," says Rob, including those at home, traveling, or living out of town. Using permanent mounted cameras, soundboards, and phones for extra visual angles, the Tech Committee now streams Shabbat and holiday services, B'nei Mitzvah, and occasional funerals, "This has always been a dedicated team effort for the betterment of our Temple Community," Rob says. "It's satisfying and meaningful to continue this service today and into the future."
